

1862, 11,000 Union forces and 4.500 inexperienced and illequipped Confederate troops battled for control of New Bern. Eventually the Confederate line broke, and Union troops pushed through forcing a retreat of the Confederate troops.

This fierce battle in the swamps along the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad, five miles south of our city, proved a major victory for the Union and led to the ensuing occupation of New Bern for the remainder of the Civil War. The Union's presence required the Confederacy to divert troops to the defense of the railroad that might have otherwise been used in the critical

Battlefield Park Has a New Cannon



A non-firing replica of a model 1841 six pound field cannon has been donated to the New Bern Historical Society and is now permanently displayed at the New Bern Civil War Battlefield Park. This was the smallest caliber smoothbore cannon used in the early years of the Civil War by both the Union and Confederacy. Several of these cannons were used in the defense of New Bern during the Battle of New Bern in March of 1861.



Linda Lore donated the cannon in memory of her husband Richard K. Lore, former historian of the Historical Society, and in memory of the soldiers who fought in the Battle of New Bern.

Young Historians Visit Historical Architecture

On Friday, Nov. 18, teacher Cille Griffith and fifth graders at the Epiphany School joined Buzz Mead for their annual meeting and tour of the New Bern Historic District. From Buzz Mead's Old Goat Club on Johnson Street, students set out on foot to locate and hear more about historical landmarks on Front, Hancock, Johnson, and New Streets. Prior to the tour, students had benefitted from several months of study using NC Architecture Heritage Education Lessons, photographed and written by Richard Lore, and funded by the Kellenberger Historical Foundation. The students found it fascinating to identify various architectural styles that they had seen in photos. 




