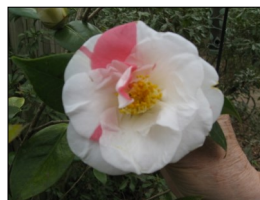
Curator's Corner...by Jim Hodges

Camellia Japonica 'Johanna Taylor'

Even during the winter months, Annette Hunt and her *Earth Angels* normally convene on Monday mornings in the garden to snip, dig, rake, and chat. Recently Annette was visited by two representatives from the local Twin Rivers Camellia Club who presented the Historical Society with a gift. Befittingly, this gift was a unique camellia with a special story.

Donald Ransom Taylor was the Executive Director of Tryon Palace in the early eighties and later Resident Director of Gunston Hall near Mason Neck, Virginia. Upon retirement, he returned to New Bern with his wife Johanna. Not one to sit idly around, he became a New Bern Historical Society

board member from 1992 to 2004 of which eleven of those years serving as curator of collections. In addition, Donald Taylor was an accomplished gardener and a founding member of the Twin Rivers Camellia Club. Over time he developed a new "camellia cultivar" that was named for his wife and identified as *Camellia Japonica* 'Johanna Taylor'.



The flower is a semi-double bloom with an occasional pink stripe which was certified by the American Camellia Society Registration in 2010.

Donald Taylor sadly passed away in June 2011. Due to the generosity of the Twin Rivers Camellia Club his legacy survives with this beautiful camellia adorning the Historical Society's garden.

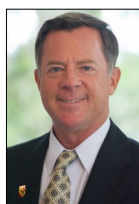
Coming aboard as Editor in Chief is **Jay DeLoach**, retired Navy Rear Admiral and former Naval History & Heritage

It's hard to believe that a battlefield could be a busy place. I mean, it just sits there and people visit it, right? Guess again...besides the day-to-day maintenance and upkeep, we have a number of projects in the works right now that keep our volunteers busy.

We spent the winter preparing for the annual Harry Goodman Battlefield Adventure Day, with the volunteers handmaking 100 wooden rifles to be distributed to the children. We hope to announce a new fall date for this great family event.

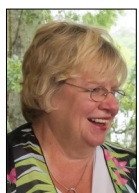
Second, we were thrilled to be approached by NBHS member **Jon Segal** who offered funding to develop an audio tour for the battlefield. We are working with a local developer who has already developed a test model. Essentially, anyone will be able to download a free app for their smart phone that will enable them to listen to audio files that tell all the stories on our interpretive panels. The app will also have maps and images, multiple voices and even background music, to bring to life what happened at the park some 150 years ago. Thank you, Jon!

Member and architect **Pat Hart** is busy developing more interpretive panels for the Visitor Center and the newly acquired property by Redan 1. We now have the new self-guided park tour brochure ready for distribution. With updated maps and details, it will be a big help to our steady stream of visitors.

Shown in the photo are volunteers **Bill Long, Frank Bartholomew** and **Don Ingraham**, who, along with **John Wright, Gene Lock** and **Rod Rhodes**, are working on a new permanent display. When complete, we will have an 1800s example of a dirt-covered structure that settlers and soldiers would have used if they had no other means of shelter. It is an A-Frame style wooden post structure, covered with pine needles and dirt for insulation and provides shelter for two adults.



Finally, Eagle Scout candidate **Jonathan Swimmer** is seeking his council's approval to move forward on a footbridge in front of Redan 1. He expects construction to begin next month.

One of my jobs as Historian is to write stories and share information about New Bern's history. That includes posting on Facebook. I am delighted to report that we have reached several milestones this year. We now have 5,213 followers on our

Facebook page and have over 5,000 page "likes". That is a significant number of people who are interested in New Bern history and our events. Kathy Morrison, 1st VP and Publicity Committee Chair, posts upcoming events and I post stories and photos. Our most popular weekly article is Wednesday's "What's in the Attic with Jim?" Jim Hodges, our wonderful Curator, shares lots of interesting things from the collections that have been painstakingly curated and preserved.

Our Facebook posts have resulted in some wonderful and heart-warming connections. In September, we posted about the American Legion Anniversary and the addition of



soldiers' names to the WWI Memorial. Through our post about Thomas Coley, a Craven County soldier who was killed in action, we were able to connect a Coley descendent with family members he didn't even know about, and they were able to share family photos and stories that neither knew even existed.

We would love your help in keeping our Facebook page prominent for even more people to discover. You see, Facebook constantly changes their algorithms for deciding what posts viewers will see. When we first started our page, "likes" were very important - if you liked our page you would continue to receive information in your newsfeed.
