Over the past several years, work to restore the Attmore-Oliver campus has continued, supported by the Investment in History
Campaign and



your generous donations. John and Beth highlighted the beauty of the campus with their lovely reception layout.

This work was largely due to the efforts of our volunteer Earth Angels, the Grounds Work Team, Rodman Williams restoration contractor, Bengel Roofing, and Trader Construction Company. These work teams have put countless hours into the gardens, replacing rails and pickets on the Attmore-Oliver house back porch, siding on the Ward House, replacing decayed wood on the garden shed, repairing lamp posts and trimming bushes and shrubs countless times.

Rodman Williams, who just passed away, was the premier old home restoration contractor in the New Bern area and had worked on over 100 homes. Rodman was always available for advice on historically accurate repairs. I heard him say that two of his most memorable projects were the front fence of the Historical Society on Broad Street and the AO House front entrance. We are especially grateful to our friend Rodman who has left an incredible legacy here for future generations.

Curator's Corner

Full Circle

One of the most rewarding life chapters as a youth in New Bern was the loving bond that I enjoyed with my maternal grandparents, John and Alice Taylor. Their Broad Street home was filled with many things that captured the fascination of a young boy. My grandparents were especially proud of a mahogany slant top desk that was located in their library. As the years slipped by, I developed an appreciation for this beautiful example of workmanship. The joinery as well as the inlay work and marquetry are exceptional. On several occasions in the late 1950s and 1960s, Granddaddy had told me that a local man by the name of Clyde Long Chesson was the

Riverside area of New Bern was a saw filer by trade. Along North Craven Street that earlier had been called Griffith Street, there were several large lumber mills that relied on the skills of saw filers to keep their saw blades sharp and operating efficiently. It is my impression that Mr. Chesson had a work shop behind his home where he would fabricate cabinets and furniture in his spare time. Most likely, the desk was acquired by my grandparents in the late 1930s or early 1940s.

My Granddaddy passed away in 1974 at the age of 85 and my Grandmother, who her grandchildren affectionately called Mammy, passed away in 1985 at the age of 92. Their estate was distributed to their three children and their children, the grandchildren. The Chesson desk went to a cousin who moved several times over the years.
She eventually left coastal North
Carolina and relocated to Kansas. Not



having a need for the Chesson desk, she gifted it to another cousin who had a summer home in Beaufort where it sat in his garage for a period of time. Now, follow carefully, this cousin really didn't need the desk either because he didn't spend much time there anyhow, so his brother, my other cousin, who has a residence in Morehead City, contacted me to see if the New Bern Historical Society had an interest in giving the old desk a forever home. Cousin Johnny delivered the desk back to New Bern in November 2021. After several months of cleaning, repairing, and refurbishing, the old Clyde Chesson desk that belonged to my grandparents has truly come full circle and is proudly displayed in the New Bern Historical Society's Attmore-Oliver House. I am confident that my Mammy & Granddaddy would be pleased.


Battlefield Park News
