

### **Happy New Year!**


Whether or not you're a resolution maker, I hope 2022 brings you peace and contentment.

### **Curator's Corner**

#### Jewels in the Crown

Despite the challenges created by the pandemic during the year, the curator department has pressed on and actually realized a very productive 2021. A previous newsletter article focused on the Hollister Collection that was acquired by purchase in December 2020. After several months reviewing the extensive documents and related items, I am pleased to announce that the Hollister Collection has been organized, selectively accessioned/ scanned, and for the most part completed.

In addition to that collection, the Historical Society has received numerous assorted gifts that have provenance for New Bern and Craven County. Sharing all of these with you is not within the scope of this article; however, I have included two artifacts that are representative and especially interesting.

#### Bleu de Hue Plate

Chinese blue and white porcelain ordered by the Vietnamese dynasties in the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries have special designs and marks. The decorations

are puzzling because of Chinese, Vietnamese, as well as, Japanese influences. The 8 ½" diameter plate donated



by Charles Adams, a veteran antique dealer, who many years ago attended the estate liquidation of a descendent of Capt. William Willis Roberts. It is represented that this plate was acquired by Capt. Roberts when he served under the command of Commodore Matthew Perry's 1854 expedition when the ports of Japan were opened to western trade. After the journey, he returned to New Bern with a collection of this beautiful porcelain ware for his family. He is also recognized for returning with and introducing the spider lily (Lycoris

Radiata) to the southeast United States by way of New Bern.

#### **Ideal Barber Shop Sign**

Recently I was contacted by a member who, during the daunting task of dismantling the contents of her deceased parent's home, found a glass window sign in the basement that had been there for possibly fifty years or longer. I visited the house and found myself in the bowels of the basement. Although dimly lit, I could see that this old sign had merit and New Bern provenance. The ¼ inch thick glass panel measured ~5 feet in width and ~ 3 1/2 feet in height and had no breaks,



cracks, or chips. The highlights were the hand painted letters spelling "IDEAL BARBER SHOP." The letters are offset with letters in gray paint on one side of the glass and in red paint on the other (cont. on Pg. 5)

side, slightly displaced to create a three dimensional effect. It's apparent that no stencil was used.

I discovered that a 1937 New Bern Directory showed that the barber shop was located at what was then 127 Middle Street and operated by a Clyde Belangia. The shop was located on the 300 block of Middle Street beside the Christ Episcopal Parish House where the parking lot and the rear access to First Citizens Bank currently is. The building is no longer there, but the window sign has survived.

With help from Register's Glass the sign was sized down. Wayne Register commented that the glass edge color suggests a 1920s manufacture date. The Ideal Barber Shop most likely predates the 1937 directory listing by a few years, but even using 1937 as the date of origin, this beautiful hand painted sign has managed to weather the test of time for 84 years -- truly amazing. Thank you Diane Latham Sanwick for this unique glimpse into New Bern's past.

### **Blazing New Trails**

For those of you who have not been to Battlefield Park recently, we are happy to announce we have opened a new trail that starts shortly after you cross the long Trader bridge going towards Redan 1. As you climb the slope towards the redan, you will notice an opening in the woods to your right. Although we have not finished laying wood chips along the trail's entire length, you can still walk this loop which follows the swamp to your right. You will have finished this new trail segment when you reach the terminus of our first

trail that runs along the railroad tracks from Redan 1 to the Thompson Line. Pictured below is Gene Lock on the chainsaw with John Wright behind him.



They are clearing a large stump in the new trail.

Also pictured below is an enormous pile of wood chips just delivered to the park



by Pamlico Tree Care. These pecan chips came from the tree behind the AO House

that needed to be removed due to disease. So it was a win-win for the Historical Society!

This last picture shows Lee Purcell, John Wright and Rod Rhodes standing in the area where we will have a new observation platform constructed. This area is at the end of the trail mentioned



above, where the two trails join one another and provide a view of the Thompson Line across the tracks and the scene of a great deal of intense fighting during the battle on 14 March 1862. This may be an Eagle Scout project; we are waiting to hear if the project is approved by the Scout Council. Stay tuned for an update in our next newsletter!
