

Curator's Corner...by Jim Hodges

A GLIMPSE INTO THE PAST

Recently I was contacted by a gentleman, George Allen Ives, Jr., who is a native New Bernian. Although currently residing in Durham, it is obvious that his love for New Bern is unwavering. I remembered the family from the late 1960s – his beautiful wife Gisela and their four equally beautiful blonde haired children. The Ives were a prominent old New Bern family and related to many other families that had been around since New Bern's early days.

The purpose of his telephone call was to determine if the Historical Society had an original copy of Stephen F. Miller's "Recollections of New Bern Fifty Years Ago". Although we do have a photocopy, the prospects of an original would be a most generous gift. A few days later the book arrived.

Published in 1874 by S.D. Pool in Raleigh, the book amazingly is in good condition. The author Stephen F. Miller was born in Jones County in 1805 and moved to New Bern at the age of seventeen to work as a clerk. After two years, he relocated to Georgia, earned a law degree, and enjoyed great success. Due to failing health in his later years, he focused on writing for a variety of newspapers and reviews. His early years in New Bern must have been a profoundly impressionable experience to result in fifty years later putting pen to paper and recounting some three hundred names of residents and more than fifty occupations and topics with attention to every detail. This small book is truly an amazing time capsule that displays everyday life in New Bern in the early 19th century. The book is personalized with Ives family member inscriptions dating 1908 and 1932. Thank you George Allen Ives, Jr. for sharing this unique glimpse into New Bern's past.

A big thank-you also is due to **Earl Temple** of **A-1 Tree, Inc.** for his help in getting down a tree that we had cut down that got hung up in a nearby tree. He volunteered his services

Leave YOUR Legacy in New Bern through Planned Giving

You may have faithfully saved for retirement in your IRA, putting money there and enjoying the tax savings at the time. That changes when you reach retirement and begin withdrawing funds because you then begin paying taxes on the amount you withdraw from your IRA. Once you reach 70½ you encounter the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) which generally mandates withdrawing a portion of your IRA each year. One option you have then is to give an amount from your IRA directly to the New Bern Historical Society or another qualified charitable organization without having to pay income taxes on the gift. And, doing so counts toward your required minimum distribution. It reduces your taxable income, which may have other tax benefits.
