
Centennial Countdown

As of this writing, we are only four months and 19 days from our 100th Anniversary! A century of community service is a major milestone for any organization, especially a small nonprofit. Although we've spent years thinking about how to celebrate, planning began in earnest in March 2021 when the steering committee first met under the leadership of the Co-chairs, First VP Kathy Morrison and Curator Jim Hodges. Rounding out the team are Historian Claudia Houston, Former NBHS Presidents Ken McCotter and Nelson McDaniel, and Executive Director Mickey Miller.

The capstone of the celebration will be our gift to the community—a compelling multi-dimensional exhibit of artifacts, stories, and photos at the NC History Center, produced in partnership with our friends at **Tryon Palace** and with the expertise of **Design Dimension**, a professional exhibit design and fabrication firm from Raleigh. The objective: to recognize the past, celebrate the present, and inspire the future.

The theme "Through the Looking Glass; A Journey with the Storytellers," recognizes our important role as New Bern's storytellers. We quickly learned that planning a large exhibit is an ambitious project. Two years in a nutshell: countless hours of research.

Reams of pages of drafts. Visits and meetings—lots of meetings. Hundreds of artifacts reviewed. Debates—yes, sometimes even heated. Yet more research. Rewrite after rewrite... you get the idea. We are now at the point where Design Dimension will

The Return of "Grandpa Jerkins" by Jim Hodges, NBHS Curator

It is always a great pleasure for the New Bern Historical Society to receive a family treasure that has been handed down through generations and eventually finds its way back to New Bern. Recently, we were gifted a large framed oil portrait of a gentleman by the name of Alonzo Thomas Jerkins. Although unsigned, associated documentation indicates that the artist was William Garl Browne, Jr., an English born itinerant artist who was active in North Carolina from the 1840s to the early 1880s. Of interest, the portrait of George Sitgreaves Attmore, patriarch of the Attmore-Oliver House and family that is displayed in the

Historical Society's meeting room was also one of William Garl Browne's products. Although the elaborate frame and Jerkins portrait have survived for at least one hundred sixty years, it is apparent that conservation maintenance is needed and is being addressed. Alonzo Jerkins' attire is suggestive of mid-nineteenth century America and in the portrait he appears to be forty-five to fifty years of age, which is consistent with his 1807 year of birth.

To qualify for a sophisticated portrait of this caliber, most certainly A.T. Jerkins must have been a man of prominence and means and most worthy of his story being shared. Alonzo's father, Thomas Jerkins, was a successful shipper, merchant, and builder in New Bern. As

Street, Alonzo was described as an "amiable, fun loving, and generous young man". He was a graduate of the New Bern Academy and pursued further education at the university in Chapel Hill until interrupted by the death of his mother. He returned to New Bern and eventually followed in his father's footsteps becoming a successful entrepreneur and a very active community and church leader. A.T. Jerkins' other diversified pursuits included real estate, construction, banking, mutual life insurance, river transportation, turpentine distilleries, and charitable causes.

During the Civil War and the Union

a youth, growing up on todays 300 block of Johnson

During the Civil War and the Union occupation of New Bern, Alonzo and his wife Sarah relocated to his farm "Sunnyside" in Alamance County near Graham. After their return to New Bern in 1867, their adopted daughter and only child Nancy Jerkins Dean Flanner passed away that same year at the age of thirty-five. Sarah, Alonzo's wife, unexpectedly died in 1874. Three years later, he married Susan Carr Hooper who remained with him until his

When William Garl Browne, Jr. was engaged to paint A.T. Jerkins' portrait, he also painted a portrait of Alonzo's wife Sarah. Upon his death in 1895, he willed the two portraits to his granddaughter Eliza Jerkins Flanner Patterson. The portrait of Sarah was bequeathed by Eliza to her son, Donald Patterson. Eliza bequeathed the portrait of Alonzo T. Jerkins to her grandson, Joseph Flanner Patterson, Jr. MD. The portrait by this time was affectionately referred to as "Grandpa Jerkins" and passed on to Dr. Patterson's eldest child, Priscilla Patterson Taylor, who in like fashion transferred the portrait to her eldest child, Eliza Taylor

Blackwell. With the encouragement and endorsement of her mother Priscilla and her aunt, Debbie Patterson Hedges, Eliza has generously gifted the portrait of her great-great-great-great Grandfather Alonzo Thomas Jerkins to the New Bern Historical Society. We are extremely honored and sincerely assure the Patterson Family that the Historical Society accepts the responsibility of stewardship and is proud that "Grandpa Jerkins" has returned to New Bern. 
quarter, it was a no-brainer - our uber-talented graphic artist **Cheryl Jukich.**

In the spring newsletter I mentioned we were planning to construct an elevated viewing platform at the far end of our property near the railroad tracks and across

from the Thompson Line, the main Confederate defensive position. As shown in the picture, we are

nearing completion and weather permitting - will have the stairs finished before the end of December. The next step will be an interpretive panel explaining the significance of this location.

A huge shout-out to Pamlico Tree Care, owned by Jonathan Mitchell, who recently donated over \$1700 in labor to cut down five very large pine trees that threatened to fall on Park bridges, panels and sheds. His crew of six: Gregory, Ronnie, Luis, Kevin, Ryan & Tony made short work of a project too dangerous for our volunteers to attempt.


