It has been a busy three months since our last newsletter as we have spent much time preparing for the 3rd year of History Quest.

We can put all those clues and destinations behind us for a bit and begin working on History Quest #4.

One of our clue destinations was in James City where a Rosenwald school once stood. For those who don't know, a partnership existed between Booker T. Washington, President of Tuskegee University, and Julius Rosenwald, President of Sears, and Roebuck. They devised a plan to give matching grants for building schools for African American students. If the white

school board or the state would agree to support the facility and contribute to the costs, Rosenwald would contribute cash. The local African American community would have to raise additional funds and provide construction labor. Craven County

had seven Rosenwald Schools in Craven County and one, founded in 1924, was in James City.

The Quest participants were given a short history of the Rosenwald schools and then had to answer a question as to how many rooms the school had in James City.

We had a poster with a photo of what the school looked like, as well as a blueprint of a six-room school. **Lisa Setliff**, Quest Steering Committee member, worked with her neighbor, **Mike Brett**, who was willing to build a replica of the school. The Setliff family donated the materials and Mike built a model of the school based upon a photo. Those of you who participated in the Quest saw the result of all his hard work.





The Other Coup D'Etat: Remembering New Bern, NC in 1898

## Battlefield Park News...by Gene Lock, Battlefield Adjutant

This is my first report since assuming the role of Battlefield Adjutant. After filling the role of Adjutant for 11 busy years, **Jon** 

**Miller** has left some very large shoes to fill. Thankfully he continues to volunteer at the battlefield and his guidance is highly appreciated. I am honored that Jon and the Historical Society have entrusted me with assisting with the care of our wonderful Battlefield Park.

While speaking of Jon, it is a pleasure to report that on August 7 a surprise event was held at the battlefield. Over coffee and breakfast Jon was presented with a certificate confirming his new title Battlefield Adjutant Emeritus. On hand to honor Jon were Board members and former and current volunteers.



We recently made a significant acquisition - a working replica of an 1841 Mountain Howitzer. The cannon was cast from original molds and is a good example of

light cannons used throughout the Civil War. The purchase was made possible by a very generous donation by a member of the Historical Society. The cannon was obtained from a Civil War reenactor who had participated in various events at the battlefield over the years. It is a work of art, if that can be said of a cannon, and will be fired at Battlefield Adventure Day, Living History Days, and other events.

On September 2, we hosted a living history day planned by **Mark Trail**, Commander of the 7<sup>th</sup> NC Reenactors unit. Reenactors set up a camp which reflected how

soldiers and their ladies lived during the Civil War. Over 100 people attended to see demonstrations of marching, cooking, firing, and exhibits of Civil War equipment, clothing, and cooking.

Work at Battlefield Park is an ongoing process. During the



last quarter our trails were maintained, grass and brush cut back, bridges and benches scrubbed and cleaned and repair work done as needed. New volunteers are always welcome. We work on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from about 7 until 10AM.

## What legacy will you leave?

We recently enjoyed a lovely evening with a group of **Founders Circle** members and those who are interested in becoming members. What is the **Founders Circle**? That is our designation for those who have included the New Bern Historical Society in their estate plans.
