
#### **Ghostwalk Auditions**

## Curator's Corner...by Jim Hodges

#### Benners-Kellum Photograph Collection

There is no better way to document the present and preserve the past than with the power of

photography. Since the emergence of itinerant photographers in the 1840s, New Bern has greatly benefited from a vast parade of photographers that settled here and captured the people, places, and events of daily life. A twentieth century standout was William Lucas Benners, Jr., affably called Billy, who was a New Bern fixture always seeming to be "at the right place at the right time" to capture the moment. Born in 1925, Billy Benners founded the Benners Studio of Photography in 1948 that continued in downtown New Bern until 2003. In addition to his professional career, he was a dedicated family man with five children, active with the New Bern Civic Theatre, the Elks Lodge, and the First Baptist Church.

After his death in 2011, his studio and contents were sold to another photographer; however, its survival was short-lived, and the business closed. It was rumored that Billy Benners' extensive portfolio was to be sold to an out-of-towner. However, before this could be transacted, local attorney Norman Kellum, realizing the historical significance of this collection and recognizing the importance of keeping this collection in New Bern, interceded and purchased the complete collection of photographs and negatives.

In June 2023, Mr. Kellum gifted the collection to the New Bern Historical Society with the express purpose of keeping it complete and sharing with future generations how life was portrayed in New Bern in the second half of the twentieth century.

The bulk of the images totaling 21,843 files in 2363 folders were digitally stored on an external hard drive. Several months have been invested in reviewing and organizing the images into thirty-two categories. The total number

of images has been greatly reduced due to the elimination of duplicates resulting in less required digital storage.

In addition to the hard drive images, there were 2169 raw negatives in a variety of sizes stored in eight cardboard boxes. The services of Wayne Lytton, a forty-year veteran of National Geographic at their laboratory in Washington, DC, was recruited to convert the images from negatives to positives and to utilize Photoshop techniques to make necessary modifications to enhance the images.

The collection included six large black & white prints mounted on foam board and most likely were intended to be framed. Also protected in six binders are a wide assortment of paper copies from the original digital collection. There are approximately five hundred images in the binders.

Lastly, there were thirty-four vintage glass negatives of New Bern scenes and people that Billy Benners had rescued. Possibly these can be attributed to Bayard Wootten or other early twentieth century photographers, but without definitive proof, the creator or creators of these exceptional treasures are unknown.

Hundreds of hours have been invested in reviewing, refining, and organizing this impressive collection of 8973 files in 1371 folders. My sincere appreciation to Norman Kellum for his generosity to the New Bern Historical Society and to his community. The Benners-Kellum Photograph Collection is secure and will be shared with future generations.

## Battlefield Park News...by Gene Lock, Battlefield Adjutant

During the second quarter, our Battlefield volunteers continued their general maintenance of the park. The team trimmed

overgrowth along trails and the redans, as well as replaced the ramp where the John Deere Gator is stored.

John Wright, a longtime battlefield guide and volunteer, completed a project that involved untold hours over several months to complete. John, in addition to his work at the battlefield, is also a Master Gardner who currently serves as Vice President of the Craven County Master Gardeners Volunteer Association. Before retiring, John worked with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers doing many environmental projects.

John's recent project involved the identification of numerous species of plant life at our Battlefield Park. Beginning in 2005, the New Bern Garden Club identified twenty-five species of trees, shrubs, and other understory species. These were previously marked with identifying signage by the Garden Club. During John's project, he was able to locate twenty-three of those plants.

John walked the park trails innumerable times and researched the various trees and other plant life that line our trails. His work involved examining key identifying characteristics of plants such as bark, leaf and twig structure, flowers, and buds. He also compared known species photographs to the plants at the park. John also enlisted Dr. Tom Glasgow, who was the Craven County Extension Director, to assist identifying some of the more difficult plants.

John's efforts resulted in the identification of an additional twenty plant species at the park. Signage has been posted on an example of most species. The signage includes the plant's common name as well as the scientific name. There are now 40 plant species marked with signs at the Battlefield. Furthermore, John routinely monitors the woods for the removal of invasive species which should not be allowed to damage the woodland ecosystem. He has also implemented a primitive trash rack to capture refuse that washes down from Route 70 before it can enter Bullen Branch.

This project makes our park more attractive to amateur or serious botanists as well as for parents who want to instruct their children about forest plant life.
